Unless the famous friend is Charlie Sheen...no wait, scratch that...totally want to party with Ma-Sheen.

Anyway, unless the above example is available to you, then you're going to have to go through a LOT more people to get your script in their hand.

Managers, Agents, Assistants...blah blah blah.

Now, most actors these days have their own production companies to sort of circumvent the system. This is where they get to find little passion projects and develop their own material. (and lets face fact, it's a MAJOR tax write off!) A lot of these production companies to accept submissions. So I would go that route and hope that shit lands in the right person's lap.

So, with that said, I would always send it to production companies first and foremost. Obviously, as stated above, sending it to a specific actors production company is the same as sending it to any production company. The only difference is that the letter would be a little different because you would include a "hey this script would be great for [insert celebrity name here]!"

Now, if you want an actor that doesn't have a production company (trust me, most of them do whether its listed or not...see tax write off) then I just wouldn't waste your time. Again, managers, agents, asisistants...blah blah blah. They have MANY walls to keep your plebian brain away from them. So stay safe, go for production companies.

Unless the actor is your friend. Then...duh. If he/she likes you and your prepared to show them what a giant fucktard with your script about dogs battling cats in the 5th dimension...totally. Give it to them. They'll thank you for your brilliance!
